

Vale Neville Cullenane

25th February 1938 - 9th February 2025

Sad news, but where do I start on this very likeable larrikin.

We as a building family go back many decades with Neville, but more about that later.

I believe that Neville's family started in Bassendean and at an early age his Dad was killed in an industrial accident in Ashfield which was a tragedy that no family needs.

Fast forward to him starting his apprenticeship at the Midland Railway Workshops, I am guessing as a car and wagon carpenter. During my apprentice time those boys came to the Midland Technical School to learn about carpentry. Neville was before my time. After completing his time, he applied for a job with my Grandfather and was accepted and then spent some months with our teams of carpenters building many timber-frame homes in and around Swan View and Koongamia. I was told all the above at times when we met at the VAA Club.

I bumped into Neville many times when we were picking up building materials at different suppliers, but we were always in a hurry, so it was only a quick hello. We never quoted against each other, as we both had our special clients that we looked after.

After a few more years we somehow or other both ended up in the VAA, so a friendship soon started again, but this time it was all about cars and probably a few other subjects as well.

Neville always had stories to tell, so I will let you all know about some of them.

During his time at the workshops the lads would climb into the rafters of the building and collect the young pigeons and take them home. After a few weeks, he was able to sell them for a few shillings and when the buyer let them out, they would return to Neville's loft. When the buyers came to get their birds back, he always strongly stated, they were not their bird. It's very hard to tell the difference sometimes as one who owns many birds myself.

Another time he wanted to buy another car, and he had to try and convince Maxine that he needed it, or so he said. He produced a long measuring tape with inches instead of metric measurements one morning at the Club and proceeded to tell us all what it was about. He stretched it out along the table and then explained to us that he had asked his lovely wife how long blokes live. It was explained to him that somewhere into the eighties (inches). He then pointed to his age in inches and tried to say time was getting a bit short. Not sure what the outcome of this was, but I do know we all had a good laugh, which was typical of Neville.

Occasionally after a meeting we would race each other to a point in Guildford. He was in his Chevy Ute, and I was in my 1 Tonner. Neville would go past the Workshops, and I would go via Hazelmere. He usually just beat me, and we were both glad that we did not get caught by the law, all good fun we thought.

The Club is very fortunate to have had Neville and many others along the way to build and maintain the premises that we so proudly own today.

So Neville put that nail bag and hammer away for now and enjoy the rest which you richly deserve. We will miss you, my friend, and so will many more.

We are all thinking of you Maxine, Michelle, Natalie and families in this sad time.

Rest in Peace Neville, until we meet again.

Swap Meet History (Information from Past Times Book)

t was decided very early that the VAA WA would not be a club that relied on fund raising raffles. This worked for about 15 years, it was then decided if the club was to grow and gain recognition, ideas for fund raising had to change.

In 1989, three club members were able to secure the Kiev Soccer ground in Inglewood. Our payment was to hold two car displays yearly, at the opening and closing of the soccer season. This we did for three years along with a general swap meet at Midvale Primary School. Our first "Vintage Car Parts Only Swap Meet" raised \$4,000. When we grew too big for these venues we moved to Bassendean Football Oval, where we remained for 15 years. Income remained at around \$4,000. Our next venue was the Perth Polo Club in Guildford for 10 years, then the Swan Italian Club, later the Swan Sports Club. This will be our 3rd year at our current venue, the Swan Athletic club. Over the years gaining knowledge and experience, our profits have slowly risen.

Little Charlie

The Hidden Gem in the Paddock

One rainy July weekend Sandy, Mr Chips and myself took a leisurely drive through the countryside and stopped for a coffee and a baked treat. Across from the coffee shop something piqued our curiosity in the overgrown paddock

In the tall grass we spotted a weather-beaten 1966 Land Rover Series 2A. Despite its dilapidated state, we could see the potential in the vintage vehicle. We didn't know who the owner was or if it was for sale, so we just left it as a nice thought to find a diamond in the rough, waiting to be restored to its former glory

Little did we know a series of chance events would occur to be able to bring the Land Rover home...but that's a story for another time.

Naming the Land Rover

As we admired our new acquisition, Sandy turned to me with a smile. "Let's call it 'Little Charlie'," she said. I agreed,

feeling that the name suited the plucky little Land Rover perfectly. With a name and a vision in mind, we knew they had to bring Little Charlie back to life.



and many of the components were beyond repair so another engine was sourced. Piece by piece everything in the engine bay was rebuilt or brand new, electronic ignition was installed to make it purr like a contented cat. I spent countless hours researching and finding parts, determined to keep the restoration as authentic looking as possible.

Robert Cannon with patience and precision rebuilt the gearbox, upgrading syncros to all gears.

The bodywork was another major undertaking. We sanded back to bare metal, welded new panels where needed, and Kevin Sweeny meticulously applied layers of primer and paint. We

chose a traditional shade of pastel green, reminiscent of the Land Rover's heyday. Windshield frame, bumper and cappings were re-galvanised, the interior received just as much attention with new bucket seats, a refurbished dashboard, and a restored steering wheel done by Liam Mc Connell.



The Restoration Journey

We began the painstaking process of restoring Little Charlie in the carpark of the VAA. We started by giving it a thorough clean, removing years of dirt and debris. Next, carefully disassembled the vehicle, cataloguing each part and assessing what could be salvaged and what needed replacing...which was most of it

With the chassis laid bare revealing the bulk of the work, the front, rear and gearbox crossmembers had to be replaced as well as a bulkhead crossmember. New parabolic springs held rebuilt axles in place with new brakes all round.

The engine was a challenge. It hadn't run in years,

Two and a half years of hard work and dedication culminated in the moment we had been dreaming of – re-licensing. Rob Popiel who rewired the whole car had the electrics sorted, Robert Cannon and Bob DeJong gave the nod and were confident it was roadworthy.

Inspection day arrived, as the roller door opened Little Charlie stood before me, gleaming in the sunlight, looking as if it had just rolled off the showroom floor. It was an anxious journey to the licensing centre as it stalled five minutes into the drive, I had to gather myself and give Little Charlie more RPM.

The trip turned out to be a joyous one, she passed on the first go, the assessor was impressed with the attention to detail and we finally were able to have number plates. We couldn't help but smile as we took Little Charlie for its first drive together with Mr Chips. The engine roared and the vehicle



handled the road with the grace and power of a brand new sixty year old vehicle. To all of the crew who help us on this restoration, large or small, we are forever grateful. They are a testament to their passion for vintage cars and their determination to bring a forgotten piece of history back to life.

As we drove through the countryside, we felt a deep sense of satisfaction. Little Charlie was more than just a vehicle; it was a symbol of perseverance and the joy of rediscovery. And when we passed the old paddock where it all began, we couldn't help but think of the adventures that lay ahead, with our restored Land Rover by our side.

The Doctor's Legacy

Little Charlie was found with Plantangent number plates, Tony Warner told me Loris did some digging and legend has it that Little Charlie was originally owned by a doctor named David from Mount Barker. Dr. David was well-known in

the community for his dedication and tireless service. We even met old farmers from Mount Barker who both had their children delivered by Dr David, we asked if he had a short wheel base Land Rover, which he did. He used the Land Rover as he also farmed cattle.

It's a great story to imagine he used the Land Rover to make house calls, traversing rugged terrain to reach his patients...and check on his cows.

I don't know what happened after it left the Mount Barker area but over time, it was forgotten and left to the elements. But now, thanks to the VAA workshop efforts, Little Charlie has been given a new lease on life, carrying with it the legacy of the doctor who once relied on it to serve his community.

Sandy and I felt a deep connection to Little Charlie's history and are proud to continue its story. As we drive through the countryside, we are grateful for the club and especially Robert Cannon for sticking by my side for the whole build, we could not have done it without you.

Little Charlie was more than just a restored vehicle; it was a bridge to the past, creating a sense of community and a reminder of the enduring spirit of those who came before.




